




Fanny Crosby

March 24 1820 - February 12 1915

Frances Jane Crosby usually known as Fanny Crosby was an American lyricist best known for her Christian hymns. A lifelong Methodist, she was one of the most productive hymnists in history, writing over 8,000 hymns despite becoming blind shortly after birth. Also known for her preaching and speaking, during her lifetime Fanny Crosby was one of the best known women in the United States.

Fanny was born a town called Southeast in Putnam County, New



York to poor parents, John and Mercy Crosby.

At six weeks old, she caught a cold and developed inflammation in her eyes. The family doctor was not available, and the man who came in his place was not the best of doctors. He recommended hot poultices be placed on her eyes (poultices are soft, medicated and heated) as treatment. The clumsy procedure blinded her.

Her father died when she was just a year old, so she was raised by her mother and grandmother. Both these women had a great impact on her life, they grounded Fanny in Christian principles.

At age 15, Fanny enrolled at the New York School for the Blind (now the New York Institute for Special Education). She remained there for seven years. During that time she learned to play the piano and guitar and to sing. In 1843, she joined a group of lobbyists (lobbying is when groups or individuals endeavor to influence the decisions of the government) in Washington D.C arguing for support of education for the blind. For the next 11 years Fanny joined the faculty (staff) at the New York School, teaching English and History. She eventually married Alexander Van Alysyne, a blind musician and fellow teacher. At his insistence, she kept her maiden name. They were known as "Fan and Van". They had one daughter, Francis, who died while still a baby.

Fanny was noted for writing poetry from the time she was eight years old. Composers would bring tunes and musical arrangements for her to put words to or vice versa.

Fanny was never bitter about her blindness. At the age of eight she wrote these verses:

"Oh what a happy child I am, Although I cannot see; I am resolved that in this world Contented I will be. How many blessings I enjoy, That other people don't; To weep and sigh because I'm blind, I cannot, and I won't. "


Fanny was very well known during her time and often met with presidents, generals, and other important people. She played the hymn "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" at President Grant's funeral in 1885. In her later years, she also become a popular public speaker.



"All the Way My Savior Leads Me" "Blessed Assurance" "The Bright Forever" "Close to Thee" "Jesus Is Tenderly Calling You Home" "I am Thine, O Lord" "My Savior First of All" "Near the Cross" "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Savior" "Praise Him, Praise Him" "Redeemed. How I Love to Proclaim It" "Rescue the Perishing" "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" "Savior. More Than Life to Me" "Tell Me the Story of Jesus" "To God Be the Glory" "Draw Me Nearer"
